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A SUCCESS STORY TO BRIGHTEN THE NEW YEAR

t this time of the year, many pause to think about the past year and the future. Here at the Christian Shelter, I often pause to think about some of our guests, and in particular, the guests who reformed their lives and became productive members of the community. A former guest named Janine Watson came to mind as an example of the Shelter's impact on people's lives. Her story is inspiring.

For Janine, drug abuse led her to homelessness. During a recent interview for this story, Janine recalled, "Nobody plans on being homeless, but when you have no permanency in your life, it becomes extremely easy to travel down a road of bad decisions. Like most who are taking drugs, it becomes the only thing that matters to you. You don't pay your bills and then you begin living a life of doing things you know you're not supposed to do." Her period of drug abuse was accompanied by broken promises to herself and others. She began to doubt her ability to break the drug cycle and live a better life. After much time passed during her trials, she one day admitted, "I just can't do this no more. I'm sick and tired of the life I'm living. I've got to decide and change my ways."

When a single mother and a child are homeless, the odds are stacked against them if they struggle with drug abuse. Conceding her life was in shambles, Janine called the Shelter during 2019 and asked if she could be taken in to make changes to her life. We welcomed

her as a guest. After arriving, she faithfully attended the in-house devotions, and was always willing to assist where needed. She participated in counseling services offered here. Over time, Janine was spiritually revived and made progress with many life skills. The life lessons learned during her time at the Shelter improved her self-esteem and gave her the confidence to make decisions that helped her overcome the problems of her past.

Eventually, we urged her to apply for an opening at the Village of Hope, a valuable organization also located in Salisbury. After waiting for weeks, Janine learned that she was accepted into their program! We believe that God made this accomplishment possible, brightening her future prospects. Today she recalls, "I can't explain it, but I felt like this was the place I needed to be."

As I reflected on Janine's challenges, I began thinking about the parable of the shepherd in the New Testament. The story found in Luke 15:4-6 illustrates our Savior's love and care for all people. The Evil One tempts us with many enticing things, but in the end, those promises leave us empty. As in the parable, the Lord still seeks those who have been lured away by the Evil One, trapped by his devices. I'm happy to say that the Lord went out and retrieved Janine.

During the past two years, with the Christian Shelter and the Village of Hope working in Janine's life, she has been fully employed in the baking department at Krispy Kreme, and more recently has been promoted to a Shift Manager! She attends church regularly and is living in an apartment with family members. She attends a good church, with people who lift her up, never thinking about the mistakes of her past. God has given her a stronger faith, and she is making good decisions for herself and family. It's amazing what God can do in our lives!

"I thank God for a life that was changed at Christian Shelter, and for all the people who share a word of encouragement and uplift the hearts and minds of the many homeless in our community," Janine summarized. "Homelessness is something that can touch every one of us, and it is only by God's grace that I no longer worry about my next meal and where I would sleep at night. Thank you, Lord."
